God Uses Character Defects (LOL)

When I got sober a little over 16 months ago I was terrified to go back to drinking. I made a commitment to stay as busy for AA as I had to hide, steal and lie about my drinking. I was **never** too tired or busy to drink.

I immediately became involved in "service work", although I didn't know that was what it was at the time. I only knew I was helping AA and hopefully another alcoholic.

I had the opportunity to answer the hotlines at the AA Central Office one Sunday and received a call from a lady needing a ride to a meeting that night. I told her I would be happy to pick her up. We met, went to a meeting and hit it off from the beginning. She later told me what she had told a friend before calling the hotline. "Some lady a hundred years old will answer that I can barely understand. I will have to yell into the phone. Then, she will pick me up and tell me her life story on the way to the meeting. Why can't it be someone I get along with? Someone more my age, that curses a little and smokes cigarettes with me...and is from New Jersey!!!" Yes, these were her exact requests. I answered the phone that day and in doing so I know I was right where I was

supposed to be in order to meet her need. I do smoke, curse a little (more than I should) and lived in New Jersey before moving here to Little Rock. Some may see this as a huge coincidence but for me, it's just more reassurance that when I say yes to AA, I'm saying yes to my higher powers will for me. He knows my character defects and just maybe even uses them sometimes for the suffering alcoholic to feel comfortable. The brightest point in my life is helping another alcoholic and living this program one day at a time.

Quapaw House

Quapaw House is assisting the State of Arkansas with a new program that takes male

inmates out of the prison system

and allows them to live at Hidden Creek. HiddenCreek is located at Markham and Shackleford in Little Rock. These men live here for five months. Then they are paroled out to the free world. Hidden Creek needs the help of the recovery community.

- We need volunteers to drive our vans to AA meetings any night of the week you choose.
- 2. We need to find jobs for these men while they are at Hidden Creek. They are required to find a job or they go back to prison. An employer can receive a federal tax credit up to \$2400 for each person they hire.
- 3. We need clothes. Some of these men only have their prison whites.
- 4. These men need sponsors.
- 5. When they leave Hidden Creek after 5 months we need to find them a place to rent.

If you are interested in helping or have questions call Jim Bell at 501-680-5130 and I will give you a tour and explain how you can help. If you come at meal time you can join us at the table. The goal of this program is to reduce the recidivism rate in Arkansas which is now above 50%.

JOB DESCRIPTION CENTRAL OFFICE LIAISON ARKANSAS CENTRAL OFFICE, INC.

General

The Central Office Liaison works closely with and in conjunction with the Central Office Director as the focal point of A.A. contact and communication for Area 4-Arkansas of Alcoholics Anonymous and must be responsive to the needs of A.A. groups and members. The Central Office Liaison functions under the direct guidance and supervision of the Arkansas Central Office Board of Directors.

The Central Office Liaison must have the ability to effectively represent A.A. when contacted by those seeking general information about A.A., including media, schools, churches, industry and professionals, and those working in the field of alcoholic rehabilitation.

Required Qualifications

Be a member in good standing of the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous, with a sponsor and a home group.

Desired Qualifications

A minimum of 5 years of continuous sobriety.

Familiarity with A.A. Service in such positions as secretary, treasurer, Central Office Representation, General Service Representative and other Area positions.

Ability to perform basic computer operations and standard office software, internet browsing and e-mail operations.

Familiarity with the A.A. structure, ranging from the home group to the General Service Office (GSO) and familiarity with Central Office (intergroup), District and Area functions, relations and operations.

Familiarity with the A.A. Service Manual, Twelve Concepts of AA Service and A.A. Guidelines for Central or Intergroup Offices.

Liaison Director Cont.

Willingness to be of service to the A.A. Fellowship according to the principles outlined in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous, as well as the A.A. Service Manual/Twelve Concepts for World Service.

Supervisory and/or volunteer coordination experience.

Job Duties

Work with the Board in representing Central Office. Visit at least two different group meetings per week until all the meetings in Central Arkansas have been visited. Continue to visit the groups by repeating the rotation. Encourage groups to send a Central Office Representative to the CORs Meeting, as well as participation in various Central Office activities. Insure the groups know you are the Central Office Liaison and are representing the Central Office, distribute applicable fliers, promote upcoming events and show cohesion with the A.A. community.

- Assist in maintaining in-house volunteers by making requests in meetings and leaving applications at meetings attended.
- Spend at least one shift or time each week in the office to work with the Central Office Director to coordinate the exchange of information regarding A.A. matters between groups and members.
- Write and enlist others to write articles for the newsletter. Supply information for the monthly newsletter and assist the Central Office Director to set up the newsletter for e-mail distribution.
- Work with the Central Office Director in maintaining an up-to-date schedule of A.A. meetings to be posted on the website and printed for groups and members.
- Work closely with the Activities Committee in planning and informing the A.A. community of all events and services offered, and assist with getting groups involved in planned events.
- Represent the Central Office at all conventions, events, Area Assembly and District. Request that hosts of the convention/event allow a mini bookstore and cooperate with the Winter Holiday Committee for assistance assembling baskets for speakers. Give a report to District outlining Central Office activities for the quarter and promote upcoming events.
- Attend quarterly meetings of the in-house volunteers.
- Attend all Board Meetings and Central Office Representatives meetings and provide a general report.
- Participate in the operation of Central Office in the spirit of service as reflected in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous.
- Perform any duties involving communication or coordination with Central Office and be willing to perform other duties as assigned or needed.

Line up extra A.A. activities for the holiday season. Arrange to take new-comers to meetings, answer the phones at a clubhouse or central office, speak, help with dishes, or visit the alcoholic ward at a hospital.



Be host to A.A. friends, especially newcomers. If you don't have a place where you can throw a formal party, take one person to a diner and spring for the coffee.



Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations

given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.



If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.



Don't think you have to stay late. Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



Worship in your own way.



Don't sit around brooding. Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations. Remember— "one day at a time."



Enjoy the true beauty of holiday love and joy. Maybe you cannot give material gifts—but this year, you can give love.

Sometimes Quickly Sometimes Slowly

Sunday, November 24, 1963 was clear and cold. Only two days earlier President John F. Kennedy had been shot and killed in Dallas. I was 13 years old and sitting in the congregation of a Deep South Methodist Church where my father was the pastor. The building was packed with people trying to attach meaning to the horrific event.

I don't know for sure if my dad knew the impact of what he was about to say when he stood to deliver his sermon. I suspect he did. The civil rights movement was in full swing in the cities throughout the south. Nothing happened in our small community but opinions were strong and our white membership had little or no support for this crusade. There were people who were willing to support segregation by any means necessary.

Dad's sermon was entitled "It is Hate That Kills" and addressed the issue of Civil Rights directly. He spoke of the profound hatred that many had for Kennedy because of his support of the movement and dad was clear that he also supported the cause. Even at 13 I knew that this was huge and that I wanted to be the kind of principled man that my father was.

Within a year, I discovered alcohol and the principals I wanted to follow dropped away, sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly.

You know the story. We lose that which we once thought was important. In time I got sober and things began to change; sometime quickly, sometimes slowly.

One of the most wonderful experiences AA has given me is that I am able to live more like the man I wanted to be in 1963. For that I am grateful.
